TRAVEL NOTES

CLIMATE

The average high temperature in Cleveland in July is 85 degrees, with about a 30% (average) chance of rainy days. Low temps are about 60. Check weather online before travel!

CONVENTION HOTEL

Our headquarters hotel is the Cleveland Marriott Downtown at Key Center, Overlooking Lake Erie and a breathtaking city skyline, this 25-story downtown luxury hotel is situated in the heart of the business district, connected to Key Center. The hotel is entirely smoke-free, and amenities include flat-screen TVs, plush bedding, wireless high-speed Internet, CD player alarm clocks, and MP3 stations. TRAVEL TO CLEVELAND

Cleveland is easily reached by all forms of transportation. Its central location makes driving an easy option for those from a wide area of the East and Midwest. Driving Directions from any origin point are available on the Hotel website. The Amtrak station is one mile from the hotel, and the Rapid Transit subway station (including direct trains to and from the airport) is across the Public Square.

GETTING TO AND FROM THE AIRPORT

The Marriott is 12 miles from Cleveland-Hopkins International airport:

AIRPORT RAPID TRANSIT SERVICE,

direct to and from the airport on the RTA's Red Line, costs only \$2.00 and takes 30 minutes. Take the elevators or escalators to the lower level of the terminal. RTA's Airport Station is near the center of the ticketing and baggage claim levels. Service is approximately every 15 minutes. Your destination is Tower City Station. When you exit the station and shopping mall above it, head right diagonally across the square toward the tallest tower. The Marriott is in that complex (Key Center), with its main entrance around the corner to the right. For more information, visit www.riderta.com/pd_airport.asp.

DRIVING: I-71 North to Downtown. Exit

171B to Ontario Street and proceed North about ½ mile. Turn right on St. Claire Avenue, then right on West Mall Drive. Hotel is located on West Mall Drive off of Public Square in the heart of downtown Cleveland.

TAXI: Market rate; estimated \$40-60 one way trip.

Registration Fee does **not** include lodging or convention bus transportation. Fees are refundable in full if cancelled by June 5, 2009. After June 5, refunds will be made only for reasons of health or family emergency, and a \$100 non-refundable fee will apply. No refunds will be approved after the start of the convention.

CONVENTION TRANSPORTATION to all convention venues in air-conditioned, restroom-equipped coaches is optional, and at an additional fee. It is strongly recommended. Because this is a largely urban convention, parking at convention venues cannot be guaranteed and will often be available only in paid parking facilities. Parking at the Marriott Hotel is \$20 per day.

heard at any previous convention. Not only will we see several 19th-century American-built organs, but also those of unique interest ranging from a ca. 1785 Dutch Chamber organ to a recently built 18th-century Italian-styled instrument, replete with Glockenspiel, Timpani, and bird stops! Daily demonstrations will be kept brief, with well-chosen artists showcasing each instrument's flexibility. Our late afternoon and gala evening events include some of the finest venues we have to offer. Opening day features a largely unheard 1919 Austin in Cleveland's Masonic Auditorium, the perfect vehicle to showcase the orchestrally oriented talents of Peter Richard Conte. The first full day is capped off by two stellar performances: Joan Lippincott on the legendary 1956 von Beckerath organ at Trinity Lutheran Church, and Ken Cowan showcasing the twin-consoled grand romantic 1948 Voutelet-Holtkamp-Sparling organ at the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist.

Toledo, Ohio, is our ultimate destination on Tuesday evening. We first hear Stephen Tharp on the recently restored Skinner in the Toledo Museum of Art. Then, following a Hungarian-themed dinner, Todd Wilson returns to his boyhood roots to demonstrate the 1931 E.M. Skinner at Our Lady Queen of the Most Holy Rosary Cathedral, perhaps the most pilgrimaged organ of its type. Wednesday holds several surprises, culminating with Nathan Laube at the helm of the 1942 Casavant Frères Limitée organ at Cleveland's First Methodist Church. Thursday afternoon we find our way to Oberlin Conservatory—one of the most active organ centers in the U.S. We'll bring back memories for returning alumni while also showcasing some recent organ building activity in town. The accomplished Jack Mitchener and Diane Meredith Belcher will perform on the organs in First Church, Fairchild Chapel, and Finney Chapel. Friday we will go out with a bang—ending in the glorious Art Deco landmark Severance Hall, where Thomas Murray will put the lovingly restored 1929 E.M. Skinner through its paces.
